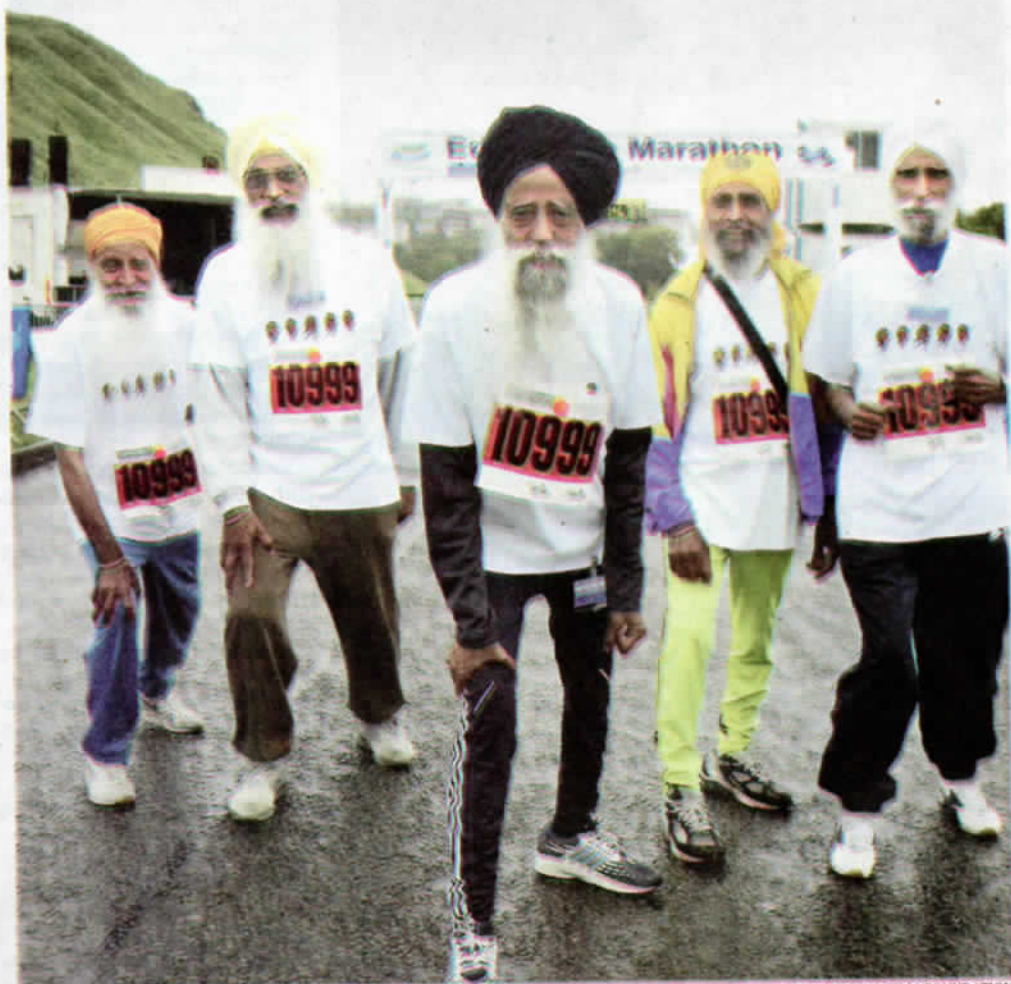

**SIKH INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL** (Friday and Saturday) Life's joys and sorrows as seen through the eyes of Sikhs around the world are the focus of the documentaries — some of them premieres — at this year's festival, the seventh sponsored by the Sikh Art & Film Foundation, at Asia Society. There are films covering a cancer hot spot in northern India and a young man's personal journey amid the mass killings of Sikhs in the India of 1984. And there is "Nothing Is Impossible," a profile by Nina Duttaroy of Fauja Singh, a nonagenarian long-distance runner (center, in photo above). "Nothing" is included in the first of two showcases of films on Saturday from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.; the second will continue from 2 to 5 p.m., and both will include after-screening discussions. The films are in English or with English subtitles. Friday's program is sold out, but tickets are available for an after-party from 10 p.m. to 1 a.m. (\$25); there is also a closing party on Saturday from 11:30 p.m. to 2 a.m. at the New York Public Library, Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street (\$50).
